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# AUSBLICK RACER AGAIN TOPS IN THE WORLD!

For the second year in a row, an Ausblick J4 Boy earned first place on Team USA at the Whistler International Children's Race. Eric Andersen followed in Cameron Bence's boots by first qualifying for this very prestigious event and then being number one in the time trials. This was just the start of Eric's fantastic week in Canada.

### **How Did Eric Get** There?

Eric's Region II and Central Division ski racing this season left no doubt he was on his way to the Junior Olympics. He had first place finishes in the majority of his regular season USSA races. So he headed off to the Rocky/Central Junior Olympics with many expectations and hopes riding on his shoulders.

At Crested Butte, Eric skied better than most,

but not up to his own standards. Still, he earned a 2<sup>nd</sup> in GS and

4<sup>th</sup> in Slalom and was tied with two other boys for 3<sup>rd</sup> overall. Since only the top three get invited to Whistler, that tie had to be broken. That's where the great attitude and training provided by Ausblick came into play. Each of the three tied boys had taken a fall but the other two apparently shrugged their

shoulders and skied on down with a DNF, knowing they were out of the medals hunt. But Eric did what all Ausblick racers should do – he hiked back up and reran the gate, taking a 27<sup>th</sup> place. While this run put him out of the medals, his completing the run is what gave him the tie-breaker – and he was off to Whistler!

### What Happened in Canada?

At Whistler, Eric joined a team of 8 other top US boys (three from the Eastern and Western JO's - plus the two others from Rocky/Central) and trained with US Development Ski Team coaches. He stayed in a condo with four other boys and they had to get themselves and their gear out to the chairlift every morning by 7. Then they skied hard until early afternoon when Eric's dad, Carstenn, got to spend about an hour with

Eric – "just enough time to have ice cream together"! Then Eric headed

off to tune his skis with the US Ski Team Technician ("she's done Tommy Moe's and Picabo Street's skis – she really knows what she's doing") and then review videos of his skiing with the coaches.



#### Finally - the Races!

After 4 days of training and time trials, where Eric was 1<sup>st</sup> in the U. S. in GS and 3<sup>rd</sup> in Slalom, making him first overall, it was time for the International Race.

Top J4 athletes from 20 nations were there, including Austria, Italy, Switzerland, Norway, and Japan. Eric was seeded first for the U.S. Poor early run ski conditions hampered Eric and most of the other top seeds, so his 19th place finish in GS was a disappointment. But still a great result against the

world's 60 top ski racers. The night before the last day of racing, Eric was given attitudinal advice he'll never forget. "Go out there and simply be a beast – beast it out all the way down", said the U. S. Ski Team coach. Eric's first Slalom run resulted in a tie for 5<sup>th</sup> place. Again, the coach said, "Be a beast". So Eric really turned it on and took 1<sup>st</sup> in the second run by such a margin that he ended up with a combined time that captured the Silver – and nearly the Gold (only 0.06 seconds away). Congratulations on a phenomenal finish, with all the pressure on, to Ausblick's Eric The Beast.

## **Thoughts from Race Program Director, Bill Wong**

Ausblick's having the top American racer in J4 two years in a row "doesn't happen by accident". It's an accomplishment that every person on the team can take some credit for. In the past couple years "the kids have really come together, the parents have really come together, and the coaching staff and philosophies have really come together". Eric has a "tremendous amount of commitment and he just really loves to ski race". A specific attribute of Eric's that really stands out is that he "always sets goals—and sets high ones. Then he reaches them and sets even higher goals, so he's always surpassing his original goals." Eric echoes this in giving advice to younger team members. He says "set high goals and always believe you can do it".

## HIGH SCHOOL RACING: A UNIQUE TRIP TO NATIONALS BY NIKI LUDWIG

My teammates and I ate lunch and hurried into the lobby for a team meeting. There we learned that the race was canceled due to the weather and snow conditions.

Despite the weather and snow conditions the Wisconsin teams did an outstanding job. The Wisconsin girls finished 2<sup>nd</sup> next to Vermont and Justin Bence helped the Wisconsin boys ski to a great 3<sup>rd</sup>.
